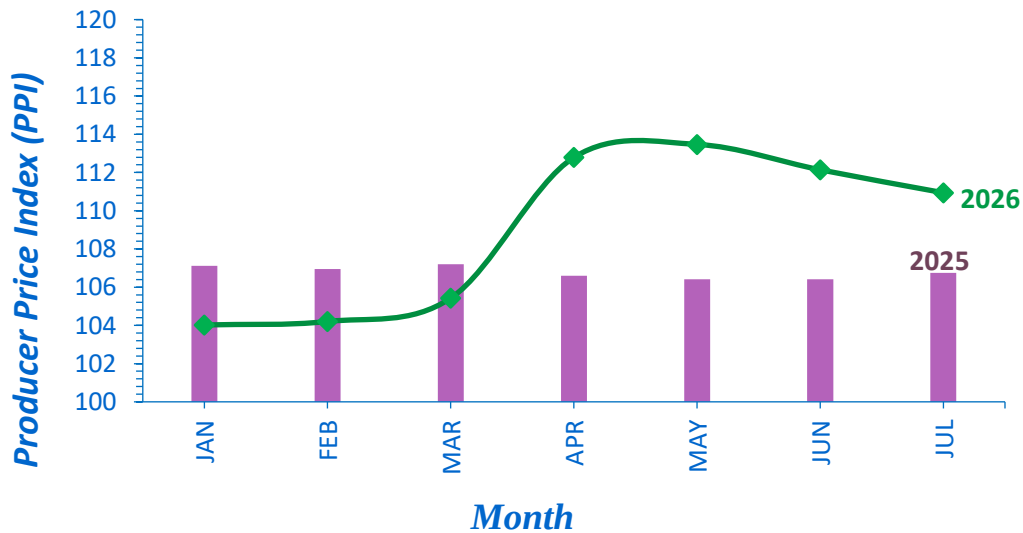


- **Industrial Producer Prices Increase by 2.06% in the First Seven Months of 2026**
- **Industrial Producer Prices Increased by 3.93% in July 2026.**
- **Industrial Producer Prices Decreased by (1.07%) in July Compared to June 2026**

The Department of Statistics (DOS) issued its monthly report on the Producer Price Index (PPI) for July 2026, which recorded an increase by 3.93% compared to July 2025, and a decrease of (1.07%) compared to June 2026. On the cumulative level for the first seven months of 2026, the PPI had increased by 2.06% compared to the same period in 2025.

Accordingly, the PPI for the first seven months of 2026 reached 109.00 compared to 106.80 for the same period in 2025. On a monthly basis, the PPI of July 2026 reached 110.94 compared to 106.75 for the same month in 2025. Also, the PPI of July 2026 recorded 110.94 compared to 112.14 in June 2026.

Comparing the PPI for the first seven months of 2026 with the same period of 2025, there were increases in the price of “*Manufacturing Industries*” by 1.89%, with a relative importance of 88.74%, prices of “*Quarrying Industries*” by 6.19%, with a relative importance of 5.36%, and the prices of “*Electricity*” by 1.06%, with a relative importance of 5.91%.

On the commodity level, the increase in the PPI of July 2026 compared to July 2025 was due to the increase in prices of “*Manufacturing Industries*” by 3.88%, with a relative importance of 88.74%, prices of “*Quarrying Industries*” by 6.99%, with a relative importance of 5.36%, and prices of “*Electricity*” by 1.91%, with a relative importance of 5.91%.

On a monthly change scale, the PPI of July 2026 had decreased compared to June 2026 due to the prices decrease of “*Manufacturing Industries*” by (1.63%), with a relative importance of 88.74%. Meanwhile, there were increases in the prices of “*Quarrying Industries*” by 7.31%, with a relative importance of 5.36%, and the prices of “*Electricity*” by 0.07%, with a relative importance of 5.91%.
